His father was Moses Dossett who operated an "Ordinary", or an Inn in N. C. The family moved and settled between the Broad and Pacolet Rivers in S. C. Moses Dossett was a Lieutenant in the S. C. militia during the Revolution. His son Thomas served under him as a private in S. C. and in Georgia, "on the western frontier". Thomas was awarded a pension of \$20 per annum in May, 1834 in Hopkins Co. Ky.

In his early infancy his father removed to the State of South Carolina and settled between the Broad and Pacolet Rivers.

Service: SOUTH CAROLINA MILITIA

He was drafted for five months. This was about three years before the end of the war.

Captain-(Futt or Tutt)

Lieutenant- Moses Dossett (this applicants father)

Ensign- James Higgins

He rendezvoused at Wafford Iron Works and marched thence through a wilderness country to Seneca Fort on the Savannah River in Georgia, that he remained on duty in said fort four and a half months where being sick he was discharged for the full term of five months. Twelve months after he returned home he was again drafted for four months under Capt. John Brumat of the South Carolina Militia. That he rendezvoused about three miles below Camden and marched thence to Laurens Ferry on the Santee River where he was stationed until his term expired.

After the close of the war he removed to Orange County, North Carolina thence to the State of Tennessee and thence to the County of Hopkins in the State of Kentucky. He states that he served his first tour in a Fort on the Western Frontiers which was garrisoned by Militia and saw no Regular Officer (nor does he believe he saw any on his second tour) unless Col. Shelby who commanded at Laurens Ferry was such.

DOSSETT

Among the first to answer a "call to arms" and to "rally round the flag" in defense of their beloved country have been the Dossett men.

Moses Dossett was living in North Carolina, County of Orange, when his son Thomas was born in 1759. In 1761 he applied for a license to establish an Ordinary, a meeting house serving food and drink, and sometimes lodging was made available.

Later the family moved to South Carolina, and settled between the Broad and Pacolet Rivers. During the Revolution, Lt. Moses Dossett and son, Private Thomas Dossett, served in the same company, South Carolina Militia. After the war, Thomas removed to Orange County, North Carolina, and married Nancy Cate, daughter of Richard and Elizabeth Cate.

After 1800 the family moved to Tennessee. Thomas Dossett (Dawset) is recorded on the tax list of 1811 and 1812. Their son John, born circa 1790, enrolled in the Tennessee Militia and fought in the War of 1812. The family soon moved farther west and settled in Hopkins County, KY. John Dossett married Margaret Whitaker (??) June 13, 1816, in Muhlenberg County. Thomas Jr., born 1802, married Sally Shank, July 1824, in Muhlenberg County. Sally was the daughter of Adam Shank and Elizabeth Frantz. Elizabeth was the daughter of Michael Frantz III, granddaughter of Michael Frantz II, and great granddaughter of Michael Frantz I, born at a Canton near Basel, Switzerland, and came to America September 1727, and settled in Lancaster, PA.

Thomas Dossett, Sr. died Sept. 4, 1834. The following year John and Margaret Dossett, Thomas Jr. and Sally Dossett, John and Ann (Dossett) Troutman and Adam and Frankie (Dossett) Rumble moved to Gibson County, IN.

Thomas and Sally Dossett's children were: Elizabeth (married Robert Williams); Susannah

(married John Anderson); Henry (married Nancy Ann Hayden); Catherine (married Ezekiel Field); Eliza (married Joshua Proctor); John (married Angeline Hartwell);

William Harrison (married Martha Cloud, and Rosella Hicks, daughter of Joseph Hicks, she was the widow of Henry Hicks who died in the Civil War, leaving Rosella with two minor children, Joseph Balim and Fayvella Hicks);

Andrew Jackson (married Mary Reneer, 2nd, Celia Stone, 3rd Elizabeth Cash.); Nancy Ann (married Clark Kirk); Sarah; and Martha Jane (married William Wilhite).

The Civil War erupted; again the sound of bugles echoed through our land. Thomas Dossett Jr. and wife Sally whispered goodbye to their four young sons. Henry enrolled in Co. G., 65th Regiment, Indiana Volunteers. He died, Dec. 23, 1863, leaving a widow and six children.

John enrolled, Oct. 8, 1861, in Co. A, 58th Regiment, Indiana Volunteers. While marching through the Carolinas he suffered pneumonia and measles, leaving him with weak eyes. He was mustered out July 25, 1865. William Harrison enrolled Sept. 5, 1862, in Co. A, 58th Regiment, Indiana Volunteers. He was wounded by a musket ball passing through his right hand during the storming of Missionary Ridge. His hand was rendered useless thereafter. He was discharged Aug. 8, 1865. *Andrew Anderson* Jackson enrolled July 15, 1862, in Co. G, 65th Reg. Indiana Volunteers. Left with a weakened condition of eyes and ears, he was discharged June 22, 1865.

William Harrison Dossett and Rosella Hick's children:

Eliza Lydia (married Thomas Phillips); America (married George Colvin); Mary (married James Lindy) (2nd Joe Summers); Thomas Jefferson, born Apr. 22, 1876 (married Katherine "Kate" Grubb), he died Dec. 2, 1943; and Ruth (married James McRoberts).

Thomas Dossett was a carpenter, painter, plasterer, and wallpaper hanger, well known for his home-decorating abilities. He was a hunter and his expert marksmanship supplied the table with wild game.

Thomas Dossett and "Kate" Grubbs' children were: Forrest Glenn, born Sept. 25, 1902 (married Frances Hawkins, daughter of Lon Hawkins and Emma Graul);

Gladys, born Mar. 26, 1904 (married Edward Wiedenbenner. Their two sons, Edward Jr., U.S.A.F., and Jack, U.S.N., served in World War II); Oleva, born October 1907 (married Ray McKenzie. They had a son, William Robert, who served in the U.S. Army, and U.S.A.F., career; and two daughters Dorcas and Rebecca); Thomas Jonathan, born July 23, 1910 (married Vivian Boger); and David Harold, born July 16, 1914 (married Jeanne Scott). Eighty years passed since the Civil War; history was being repeated. Bombs were dropped on Pearl Harbor; World War II began. Thomas and Kate Dossett saw three sons off to war.

Forrest Glenn entered the United States Army, June 29, 1942. He was a rifle marksman, Pvt. 1st Class, 97th Police Company, Aviation, stationed in South England. He was discharged June 26, 1945. He returned to the United States aboard the Queen Mary, British luxury liner converted to troop ship.

Thomas Jonathan Dossett entered the United States Army, served in Germany with the 43rd Mechanized Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, an exploratory survey of enemy territory.

David Harold Dossett served in the Merchant Marine and was the first "war casualty" from Princeton, IN. He died June 1, 1942, in a Marine Hospital in Key West, FL of burns suffered when a Tidewater Oil Company tanker, under U.S. government supervision, was torpedoed by a German submarine in the Caribbean, May 24, 1942. An item in the Evansville Press, Apr. 2, 1945, relates that in January, 1945, a Liberty Ship, the U.S.S. Harold Dossett, was launched by the Navy at Brunswick, GA. Harold's two sisters, Gladys and Oleva, attended the launching.

Forrest Glenn Dossett was a "self-educated" man far beyond his eighth grade schooling. He was well read, books being among his best friends. He was extraordinarily gifted in use of the mother tongue, was adept at communication with children or kings. He was a cement finisher, well known for his ability at road and bridge construction.

Forrest Glenn Dossett and Francis Hawkins' children are: 1. Nina Maxine Jones (reared as their first child) born Sept. 12, 1921, to William Jones and Bessie Lewis (married Herman McReynolds). Their children are: Sarah, Vera, Joyce, Joe Ellen, Michael (deceased) and Vickie. 2. Wilma Jean, born June 16, 1925, Vincennes, IN. (married George Robert Rees, Oct 3, 1942. He served in the U.S. navy, WWII, and was employed as meat-cutter at Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, and Lowell's Food Store) 3. Janice Louise, born Dec. 15, 1932 (married Robert Willis. Their son, Robert, is a psychotherapist in Philadelphia, PA, and son Stephen is a Computer Technician in California) 4. Donna Rose, born Oct. 23, 1935, (Married William Hanson. Their children are: S. Sgt. William Hanson, Crew Chief, U.S.A.F., career; S. Sgt. David Hanson, U.S.M.C., now is Chief Petty Officer (submarine) U.S.N., career; daughter Jill Ann, sales person, Lumber; Sgt. Daniel Hanson, Munitions Instructor, U.S.A.F. career; and Patrick, student at Vincennes University. 5. George Robert Rees and Wilma Jean Dossett's children are George Robert, Jr. and Marcia Lorraine.
