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As I mentioned earlier, I have never found where a Jacob Frantz sold land in Manor Twp. There was, however, a Jacob Frantz who lived on King St. in Lancaster and owned land there. Perhaps this was originally part of Conestoga Manor. That Jacob died intestate in 1777. Peter Lazarus was administrator of the estate and I do not think there were any children. Some place I seem to have read that this Jacob's wife was a Lazarus. *W 11 S 1*

The Jacob Frantz who lived on King St. in Lancaster did sometimes appear as Jacob Frank in some deeds.

The same year a warrant for 1,000 acres to James Hendricks, near Strasburg, at the same price, dated December 28, 1714 (See page 591) was granted. Also the same year and same date, a warrant to Peter Bellas at Strasburg, for 200 acres at the same price, was granted; and also, the same year and date, 1,000 acres to Thomas Reichman, of Strasburg.

Rupp states that the land taken up by Peter Bellas was in the neighborhood of Smoketown, that is near Bird-in-Hand, and that Daniel Harmon, William Evans and James Smith were neighbors. (p. 116.)

This same year, a warrant was executed to Isaac Lefever, dated October 10th for 300 acres, at Strasburg, and Rupp says, page 116, that this same year, Jacob Greider or Kreider, Jacob Hostetter, Hans Frantz, Shenks and others, settled on the banks of the Conestoga. He also says that Kreider and Hostetter arrived in America earlier than 1716, visited their brethren in faith at Pequea, and then settled on the north side of the Conestoga, two miles south of the present site of Lancaster, and that here,

Hans Frantz, Schenk, and others, settled on the banks of Conestoga; Joseph Cloud, in 1717, took up 500 acres near Pequea creek. The same year, settlements were began on the banks of Octoraro, William Grimson, constable of Sadsbury township, in 1717, was among the first settlers on the Octoraro; his neighbors were the Cooksons, Mayes, Jervis, Irwins, and some years afterwards, the Pattersons, Darbys, Mackrels, Leonards, Jones, Steels, Matthews, Cowens, Murrays, Millers, Allison, Mitchels, and others, all of whom settled on or near Octoraro.

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1716—German-Swiss Take Up Some Land in Lancaster County.

In the second series of the Pa. Arch., Vol. 19, page 607, it is set forth that in 1716, a warrant was issued to Anthony Pretter for 300 acres of land in Conestoga, dated November 16th—and page 608, a warrant dated December 9, 1716, was set forth as being issued to John Gardner for 500 acres of land on the Conestoga River—and page 608 there is a patent, dated December 10, 1716, to Thomas Dawson for 300 acres, near Conestoga. On the same page, tracts amounting to 12,871 acres, were granted to John Estauch, near Conestoga—and page 609, a tract to Columbus McNair, for 200 acres in Conestoga. In Pequea, in the year 1716 (See same book, page 609) there is a record of Daniel Fierre (now Ferry or Forry) applying for 600 acres of land near Pequea, for which he was to pay in three months, 10 pounds for 100 acres. A warrant was signed October 4th for the same.

Also note here that in 1713 (See same book, page 574) Samuel Guilden of Berne, the Mennonite Minister, asked for 800 acres in Strasburg, with the rest of his brethren. The warrant was granted January 1, 1714. We will notice this again under date of 1718,

when it was patented to Martin Kendig.

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1717—A Few More Mennonite Additions This Year.

This year a patent was signed to Hans Moyer at Strasburg for 700 acres (Rupp 624). A considerable tract was also surveyed near the head of Pequea Creek, including the old Shawanna Town by Mathias Va. bibber for some Germans to settle. This year also, says Rupp, Hans Zimmerman came to Lancaster County (Rupp 126) and Hans Graeff settled in Earl (Rupp 133).

1717—The First Ship-loads of Mennonites.

Under this date, we are given knowledge of the first ship lists of Mennonites, who were coming to Pennsylvania, and up into the Susquehanna Valley. In Vol. 3, Col. Rec., p. 29, it is stated that Captain Richard, Captain Tower and Captain Eyers (Ayers) waited on the Council of Pennsylvania with a list of Palatines or Mennonites

1735—The Solitary Germans at Conestoga.

In Volume 16 of Hazzard's Register, page 255, we are given one of the original letters of Peter Miller. Peter Miller was one of the early patrons or founders, at least, of the Ephrata community, of which the old cloister buildings are still land marks.

After stating that he published the Chronicon Ephratense, he goes on to say, that in August 1730, he arrived in Philadelphia and at the end of the year, upon order of the Scotch Synod, was ordained in the old Presbyterian meeting house by three eminent ministers, Tennant, Andrews and Boyd.

He then says, that he visited among the Germans for several years and quitted the ministry and turned his attention to the monastic ideas. In his company he says was a School Master, 3 Elders, one of them Conrad Wiser, 5 families and some single persons, who had raised a fermentation in the Presbyterian Church.

Then he says, that they had separated and incorporated with the congregation at Ephrata in May 1735.

He further says, that at that time, the solitary brethren and sisters lived in the wilderness and caves, as hermits. "And I following in the same way, set up my hermitage in Tulpehocken and laid foundations for solitary and religious life."

He then says that after about one half a year "a camp was laid out for all solitary persons at the very spot where Ephrata now stands and where then, the President lived with some hermits."

He says, at this time charity had been their chief occupation—that Conestoga was a great wilderness and began to be settled by poor Germans, who desired assistance in building houses for them, which kept them employed several summers in hard carpenter work and also increased

their poverty. At times he says the necessities of life were wanting. Then to make things worse, a constable came into the community and demanded the single man to pay taxes. Some paid and some refused. But the Constable summoned six of these Brethren to prison in Lancaster for 10 days. But a Magistrate set them at liberty. A very venerable old Justice of the Peace, Tobias Hendrick, offered himself for their bail. He said when Court came on, the fear of God came on the gentlemen who were their Judges. When they saw these 6 men before them in the prime of life and reduced to skeletons, the Judge decided that since they were so thin, that the whole lot of them could be taxed as one family. This taxation remained in force for over 50 years; that is, all the brethren of Ephrata community were just taxed as one person.

He says further, that they erected grist mills—one of three sets of stones—paper mill—oil mill—had three wagons, printing office; and then money commenced to come in. They also gave alms to the Indians, Mohawks and others. This is about the substance of this interesting letter.

1735—Conestoga Manor Parceled Out.

Conestoga Manor was surveyed in the year 1718, and the warrant to survey may be found in the Taylor papers. It is also set forth in Rupp's history of Lancaster County (page 130), as follows:—

These are... March 1, 1717 to 1718.

While the Manor was laid out and surveyed, it was not divided among purchasers until afterwards. It seems that no patents were granted until 1723 and from that time on until 1774, different patents were issued to various Germans.

As the patenting to different owners was at its height, about the year 1735, we are placing the list of patents under this year. It is better that they should be together in one paper, than to be distributed through these annals.

The principal ones are as follows:—Israel Pemberton held 300 acres, date of this patent is October 1, 1723. The Messrs. Wrights own 1500 acres—date of patent, December 13, 1735—sold afterwards in smaller parcels to John Herr, Andrew Stineman, Daniel Lintner, Jacob Kilhaver, Rudy Herr, Jr., John Kilhaver, Jacob Frantz, Godfrey Klugh, Mathew Oberholtzer, Christian Hershey, Andrew Kauffman—James Pattison 107 acres, November 21, 173, James Logan 700 acres, patent dated July 15, 1737, afterwards held by George Brenner, Philip Brenner, Christian Stouffer, Casper Souter, Adam Fisher, Valentine Rummel, Lawrence Cliffer, Christian Stake—Michael Baughman 489, Michael Mayer 131 acres, both same date February 20, 1738, Michael Mayer, sen., 217 acres, patent dated October 16, 1737, Abraham Steiner 63 acres May 3, 1740, John Wistler 167 acres July 3, 1741, Jacob Kuntz 166, Anna Ottila Betty Koffee, 166, Jacob Hostetter 475, John Shank 197 acres, patent dated July 30, 1741, Edward Smout 113 acres June 21, 1743, Michael Baughman 339, May 28, 1752, Abraham Hare 424 April 22, 1751, Jacob Wistler 125, Valentine Miller 140, both May 25, 1756, Martin Funk, 237, December 18, 1758, Jacob Wistler 202, Jacob Shuck 185, August 18, 1759, Abraham and John Miller 89, Valentine Haith 29, Robert Beatty 226 February 1760, Samuel Herr 247, John Keagy 188, Henry Funk 150, Jacob Wistler 173, Ludwig and Fredrick Ziegler 209 June 1760, John Witmer 77, Abraham Miller 204, Rudolph Herr 176, Jacob Witmer 77, November 1761, James M'Master, 247, April

Thomas Penn estimated the value of Conestoga Manor being 65 miles from the City of Philadelphia, 13,400 acres, 40 pounds per hundred acres. 5,360 pounds, Pennsylvania currency

German Swiss Distressed by Boundary Troubles.

About the year 1736 the troubles between Maryland and Pennsylvania boundary became very acute, and our German Swiss were really between two mill stones—if they sided with Pennsylvania, Maryland oppressed them, and if they sided with Maryland, Pennsylvania oppressed them—they were non-resistants and therefore, did not take up arms to defend themselves. Maryland had asserted that the Susquehanna River was

ferred his interest in his tract of one thousand acres, to others;—this land is on a stream flowing into the Conestoga, "not far from land granted to the Palatines." It was afterwards the place where the Cartliges, Indian agents, resided. Another person, Benedictus Venerick, late of Germany, took up two hundred acres, near the Palatines, in 1715.* Between the Pequea and Conestoga creeks, near the Susquehanna, Richard Carter, an Englishman, a wheel-right, located and improved two hundred acres, in 1716. The same year, Alexander Bews, took up four hundred acres on the south side of the Conestoga; Anthony Pretter, of East Jersey, three hundred acres, near Pequea, or south side of Conestoga; and John Gardiner, Jr., from Philadelphia county, two hundred acres, on the same side of Conestoga. About this time, Jacob Greider, or Kreider,† Jacob Hostater,

*In and about Smoketown, in 1715, Peter Bellas, Daniel Harman, William Evans, James Smith, settled.

†The relentless spirit of persecution, as the number of its subjects of oppression decreased, singled out individual families; of these oppressed, were the Kreiders and Hostaters—these fled for life from Switzerland to Wurtemberg; taking nothing with them from their Fatherland, except their families, and small quantities of tow cloth, a few linens, and some wearing apparel. Kreider remained but a short time—but emigrated to America, and in company with Hostater, after paying the brethren of their faith, a visit, at Pequea, settled on the north side of the Conestoga, about two miles south from the present site of Lancaster, where he took up eight hundred acres of land in 1716 or 1717, "among the new surveys at Conestoga."

Here, he erected a temporary shelter, a tent covered with tow cloth brought from Switzerland, which served him and his family till autumn, when the tent gave way to a cabin built of round, unhewn hickory saplings, and covered with bark—both were abundant.

When the weather became cold, his tawny neighbors, the

Hans Frantz, Schenk, and others, settled on the banks of Conestoga; Joseph Cloud, in 1717, took up 500 acres near Pequea creek. The same year, settlements were begun on the banks of Octoraro, William Grimson, constable of Sadsbury township, in 1717, was among the first settlers on the Octoraro; his neighbors were the Cooksons, Mayes, Jervis, Irwins, and some years afterwards, the Pattersons, Darbys, Mackrels, Leonards, Jones, Steels, Matthews, Cowens, Murrays, Millers, Allison, Mitchels, and others, all of whom settled on or near Octoraro.

The Swiss settlement received an augmentation in 1715–16 and 17; besides those already named, were Hans Mayer, Hans Kaigy, Christian Hearsey, Hans

Indians, paid him regular night visits to shelter with him, and sleep by the side of a genial fire. They were on perfect terms of intimacy and friendship; the Indians frequently supplied him and family with fish and venison, which they gave in exchange for bread. Fish were very abundant in the Conestoga and all the streams of the country; these they took with nets made of bark, or speared them with a gig made of Ashwood.—The inventive genius of the Indian is known to all who have spent some time among them, or are conversant with their mechanism. Perhaps the reader may wish to know how to make a fish-gig, if he should ever be placed in the Indians' situation, we will tell, as we were told, how the Hickory Indians, on Conestoga, made theirs. Christian Kreider, grandson of the first settler, says, "The Indians took a very slender sapling of Ashwood,—this kind of wood was preferred on account of its hardness: and burned it to a point at one end;" this, says the reader, is simple. So it is, just as easy to be done as setting up an egg on the point end, or the discovery of America, after it is known. The reader, especially our young friends, would, we think, be pleased to know how the fish were secured with a barbless, pointed stick. The Indian is never at a loss to take a fish, if he has no net, he takes either his bow and arrow or his spear, such an one-one as has just

Graaf, (who afterwards settled Graaf's Thal) Hans Pather, Michael Shank, Henry Pare, Peter Leman, Melchior Breneman, Benedictus Witmer, Henry Funk, Jacob Landis, Ulrich Houry, Hans Faber, Isaac Coffman, Melchior Erisman, Michael Miller, Jacob Kreutzer, Jacob Boehm, Theodorus Eby, Michael Donegar, and others.

Down the Conestoga, towards Susquehanna, settlements were made between 1716 and 1719—among those who took up lands and settled thereon, were David Jones, Edmund Cartlidge and John Cartlidge. Edmund Cartlidge resided in Darby township, Chester county, as early as 1698, and in 1711, in Philadelphia county,*

been described, and his tiny, barky boat; he glides to a place where, as every skilled piscator knows, fish are; here, through the calm and transparent water he strikes the spear through the body of the fish, passes one hand below, and takes a huge salmon or some other fish.

On a certain occasion, as Kreider had the honor of the company of his Indian neighbors, and having that day consulted his almanack to regulate his clock, by its indication of rising and setting of the sun, noticed the moon would, in a few weeks, be eclipsed; he informed the guests that on a certain evening, a few weeks from that time, the moon would hide her face, just as the clock would strike —; to hear, that the moon would refuse to shine, was nothing new to them, they had seen eclipses before; but that their white neighbor should possess so much prescience as to know this before hand, *was strange to them*. At the time specified when the *broad-faced moon* was to hide her disc, fifty or sixty Indians assembled; they were all attention; scarce had the clock struck, to their utter astonishment, the moon's face began to lessen. Profound silence prevailed. Their spokesman expressed the cogitations of the wonder-stricken visitors, uttered it as their sage conclusion, in these words: 'Tis the white man's God tells him this, else he would not know it before hand."

*Public Rec. West Chester, Vol. A. p. 291.

John, his brother, for many years an Indian agent, was at one time held in high estimation by the proprietary's agents; but like many others, the day of trouble came upon him "*and he was not remembered.*"* A warrant 'for land' was issued, dated "October 1st, 1718, for him to take up on the north side of Conestoga creek at some convenient place, three hundred acres, and to make an addition thereunto of two hundred acres, to be by him enclosed and held for the conveniency of pasturage for the term of fourteen years, in consideration of his services among the new settlers."

It was at the house of this gentleman a number of councils were held with the Indians. We have been in the house, built in 1719, in which the councils were held. It is now owned by Benjamin Wright, of Manor township.

It appears from the Public Records at West Chester, that John Cartlidge sold liquor *by the small*, prior to 1718, among the neighbors on the banks of the Conestoga. It was so reported by his vigilant "fellow inhabitant," to the court. Christian and Joseph Stoneman, Sigismund Landart, all late of Germany, took up lands on the Conestoga, prior to 1719, and Francis Neiff on the west branch of Little Conestoga, prior to 1715.

The following persons located lands in 1719: Jenkin Davis, late of Wales, near or on the branch of Conestoga creek, George Steward, near the Susquehanna, James Le Tort, on or near Susquehanna, where he had his station as Indian trader, and received a warrant for one hundred acres. Le Tort, Bizaillon and Chartier, had resided some years previous to the commencement of Swiss settlements among the Indians; Chartier was
