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Introduction

A memorial is something intended to preserve the memory of a person or an event. It is something designed to keep in remembrance something else which is worthy of peculiar honor or mention.

Genealogy is a record of individual or family descent. It is an enumeration of ancestors and their descendants in the natural order of succession.

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Preface

The following records of the Royer Family had their origin in a collection of Michael Zug, the father-in-law of the author. After Mr. Zug's death, we were importuned by Royers to publish his records. In 1912 we undertook the task, with the thought of only editing them. A considerable number of pages were printed, in which he is referred to as author, when it became apparent that the records were altogether too incomplete to give anything like satisfaction. Three years and more of systemmatic and fairly thorough investigation were given to the task, which resulted in the editor becoming the author. This is sufficient explanation to make clear why in places Mr. Zug is referred to as author. We have not been equal to the expense of reprinting the pages already in print.

The reader will encounter numerous abbreviations. All we have to say is, consult the table of abbreviations. The Roman numerals prefixed to names designate the generation in America from the immigrant ancestor inclusive. This is Mr. Zug's arrangement, as is also the plan of cross references, both forward and backward. The letters A. A. stand for Adjusting Appendix to be found in the back part of the book, and has to do with references forward not yet in type whose page at time of printing could not be determined.

The dividing of the work into volumes, books, parts, chapters and sections is our plan. Volumes have to do with descendants of the second generation; books, with those of the third; parts, with those of the fourth; chapters, with those of the fifth; and sections, with those of the sixth.

We have been able to include the descendants of but two of the sons of I. Sebastian Royer in this volume. It will be noticed the right hand pages are headed with the ancestors of the fourth generation.

The Outline of Families comes down to the sixth generations; and is really a family tree shorn of its twigs. If you find yourself lost in the woods while consulting the Outline of Families, recall the whom the desired party was married, then consult the Index, which is made up of family names other than Royer.

We aim to give credit for information in loco, so no acknowledgements are made here. Here only would we mention our printer, Mr. G. Holzapfel of Cleona, Pa., from whom we have received many helpful suggestions and considerations.

Permit a word in regard to the blank pages for continuing records at the end of the book. First of all, connect up with the Outline of Families by writing at the top of the first page the name of the ancestor of the sixth generation, giving his page in the Outline of Families and also in the body of the book. By so

doing you will have placed your foot on the first step of the stairway leading to the top.

A work of genealogy to the individual may with reverence be likened to the field in which is the pearl of great price. The field is bought not so much for its acres, though they be "acres of diamonds", as for this one pearl. Each stone, however, may be the pearl of great price to some one.

This book aims to stimulate a healthful interest in ancestry. It holds out no assurance of a vast fortune in the hazy past, which the ship will surely bring in, if you only part with a few dollars. Godliness in ancestry is the best fortune. Yet it is not enough to be children of Abraham. To be the real children of Abraham, we must do the works of Abraham; and each one of us should be able to say, "A greater than Solomon is here." We fail to honor our fathers when we fail to keep a record of them. Endless genealogies are profitless, but our Lord's ancestory is given twice in the New Testament.

We confess to errors of omission and of commission. Be charitable with us. We have done our best.

He laid the foundation for the Tulpehocken congregation; the organization being effected the year of his death. His grandfather was Ulric Zug, a native of the Canton of Zug, Switzerland, whence on account of religious persecution he fled to America in the ship James Goodwill, in 1727, with cousins Peter, Henry and George, arriving in Philadelphia on Sept. 27. He settled in Lancaster Co., Pa., near White Oak station, about 15 miles n. of Lancaster City. He was baptized into the Brethren Church in 1742. Eld. Abraham Zug had five children:

She died at their home (till recently owned by Calvin Groh) near where she was born and raised, on Monday morning. June 30, 1856; aged 44 yrs., 3 mos. and 18 ds. In 1844 he bought a 10 acre tract of land from his father-in-law, on which he erected a grist mill in 1845. In 1860 he married as his second wife Elizabeth, daughter of Michael and Catharine Myer, no relative of his first wife. She was born in Bethel Twp., Berks Co., Pa., Jan. 2, 1812; died July 6, 1870, in the same house at the mill where mother died. He was an ingenious man; he obtained several patents on a mower and harvester. So in order to facilitate the manufacture thereof more fully, he moved to Lebanon in the fall of 1863, and in the spring of 1864 he moved back again to his mill. He married as his third wife Susanna Zern, Nov. 28, 1871. She was born Oct. 26, 1838; and died Nov. 21, 1875; aged 37 yrs. and 25 ds. He had moved from his mill property to Richland, in a house he had previously built, where he died at the age of 67 yrs., 4 mos., and 6 ds. The Brethren Sunday School was started in this house in 1899, and was practically the beginning of the Brethren's work in the city of Lebanon. He maintained a high reputation for business integrity, and after the death of his wife, consoled himself with genelogical researches of which he had always been fond. He devoted his work specially to the Zug and Royer families, but he followed out many families which had married into these. He was a devoted father, supplying remarkably well to his children the loss they suffered in the early death of their mother. He never remarried, notwithstand his nature was keenly sensible to companionship, making the sacrifice for his children's sake. No preacher was more ardent than he in upholding the doctrines of the Brethren Church, and few could uphold them more ably. Had he joined the church in his early years, it is not unlikely that he would have been called to the ministry.
