HOOSIER ANCESTORS

St. Patrick's Day festivities motivates many genealogists to retrace their Irish ancestry. Estimates are that one-seventh of the Hoosier population in 1950 were from Tennessee where first settlers were Scotch-Irish Presbyterians of North Carolina.

Next came the Irish and Scotch-Irish from Virginia, by way of the Shenandoah Valley, while others crossed directly over into Tennessee.

A new booklet, "Sources for Genealogical Searching in Tennessee," compiled by Mrs. Betty McCoy includes historical background, settlement, where to locate vital, land, military, census, courthouse records and tax lists.

Also included is a partial list of records destroyed by fire, church, cemetery and school records, maps, references and guides plus list of libraries and historical societies with their holdings.
