The Shenandoah Valley Historical Institute was formed in 1982 as a nonprofit consortium of academic institutions and historical societies in Augusta, Rockingham, Page, and Shenandoah counties in Virginia. Its purpose is to facilitate extensive research in local records and quantitative analysis of Shenandoah Valley communities in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, particularly the ethnic and religious diversity and resulting pluralism of the early Valley. First year goals include location and identification of as many public, church, and private records from the 1740-1830 period as possible and the publication of a comprehensive guide to these records. The Institute also hopes to develop a computerized cross-referenced list of individuals whose names can be found in Valley records for that period. This will serve as a first step to more complex analysis but will be of immediate value to genealogists and local historians. Further details are available from:

DAGUERREOTYPE CARE: Experts advise the amateur not to touch, clean, or polish a daguerreotype because it is an amalgam of mercury on a silver surface. Thus one can easily wipe off the image. A professional photographer can clean a true daguerreotype and then make a copy of it. As a safeguard it may be wise to make a copy prior to any cleaning.

GERMAN FIRST NAMES: Germanic ancestors often used the middle name or one of several middle names as the call name. My guess is that the first name was given to invoke the blessing of a patron saint, famous person, or beloved relative. One first name was often given to all the children in one family, and in some instances certain names would be used throughout a community. In public and church records, however, officials would often record only the first name with the middle name dropped or reduced to an initial. Beware that the "Henry" in the family record and the "John" in the census records may well be the same John Henry.

GERMAN SURNAMES: In Germany the use of surnames appeared first among the nobility of the Middle Ages. Some surnames came from place names—that is, cities, regions, inns, dwellings, rivers, and other sites-or trades. Generally the original surname became the permanent family name, but some exceptions exist. Upon acquiring farms or homesteads, individual branches of a family frequently took the name of the previous owner or the family from whom the property was purchased or the name of the homestead. For example, Johannes Meyer married Anna Maria Meerpol. Anna Maria inherited the farm from her father. Johannes then became known by and recorded his name as Johannes Meerpol, born Meyer. Children born to this couple prior to the inheritance of the farm continued to use the surname Meyer. Children born to the couple after they took over the farm were given the surname Meerpol.

LEBANON COUNTY INDEXES: The Lebanon County Historical Society has indexed the following records from the Lebanon County Board of Health: (1) Births from April 1, 1892, to December 6, 1905; (2) Deaths from April 1, 1892, to December 31, 1905; (3) Marriages from April 10, 1892, to April 19, 1906. More than 550 certificates—in categories, for example, of military service, education, births, and marriages—have been abstracted and the names cross-referenced. Genealogy from the Bible collection has also been updated. In 1983 the Society plans to index the history of the Ninety-Third Regiment and records of the Tabor United Church of Christ.
